#### **Constellation's Crew Heaves To at Battelle**

Saturday, 1 December, 7:30 PM

Nautical music enthusiasts from the dry side of the mountains will welcome the return of Hank Cramer and Constellation's Crew. Although based in the Pacific Northwest, they are the official ship band for the famous sailing warship, the USS Constellation, moored in Baltimore, Maryland. The Crew has released two CD's and a music video. "Sing Out!," the national folk music magazine, called their first CD "the most beautiful and accomplished album of sea music we have ever heard." Constellation's Crew served as the principal sea-music group for Tall Ships 2005, and will repeat that role next summer for Tall Ships 2008. They also performed as headliners for the Lunenburg Folk Harbour in Canada this summer.

Constellation's Crew performances blend traditional sailor a cappella work songs ("shanties") with the instrumental tunes played aboard ship. They also infuse their shows with the history and lore of the "age of sail." Lead-singers include Hank Cramer, Mike James, Brian Maskew, Jessie McKeegan, Di Meyer, and Mark Iler. The principal instrumentalists are Steve Akerman (octave mandolin, banjo, viola); Michelle Cameron (cello, bass); Burt Meyer (concertina); Davey Hakala and Rachel Maskew (fiddles). Val James and Kit McLean Cramer round out the band.

Originally launched in 1797, the USS Constellation was totally rebuilt in 1854 and is now a national historic site in Baltimore's Inner Harbor. Hank Cramer and the late Steve Guthe first visited the ship in drydock in 1996, during an \$11 million restoration. The director of the project commissioned Hank to put together a music CD which would highlight the ship's history and help fund its preservation. Hank, in turn, enlisted a "crew" of singers and players to make the album – and Constellation's Crew was born. The 3RFS concert on Saturday, December 1 will include a ten minute video tour of the USS Constellation.

The band is now an annual favorite at the Tumbleweed Music Festival, and has toured internationally. Their circuit ranges from "Honolulu to Halifax, Lahaina to Lunenburg." This concert will be held at Battelle Auditorium in Richland. Tickets are \$11 general/\$9 seniors and students when purchased in advance at Bookworm stores, and Octopus' Garden. Admission is \$1 more at the door. 3RFS members receive a \$3 discount.

### **Uncle Joe's Banjo Band Perks Up Coffeehouse**

#### Friday, 14 December, 7:30 pm

Uncle Joe's Banjo Band will pay homage to a wide variety of music when they headline the 3RFS coffeehouse in December. You can expect to hear everything from bluegrass to country, folk to gospel, and blues to standards.

Uncle Joe's Banjo Band is a bit of a misnomer as there is actually no Uncle Joe and the band is comprised of more than just banjos. Uncle Joe is actually local musician and singer Paul Knight who has been playing throughout the Tri-Cities for years. Paul can easily switch between slide guitar and banjo as easily as the Banjo Band can change

from gospel to bluegrass. Paul has performed at a variety of venues including the Tumbleweed Music Festival, Sacajawea Heritage Days, and openmics throughout the Tri-Cites. When not performing as a solo act and accom panying himself on harmonica, Paul often fronts blues duos and trios.

Paul's clear tenor voice is well suited to the band's old-time repertoire. The Banjo Band is composed of a group of rotating musicians who share the same respect for the heritage and traditional of American music. Some of the regular members of the Banjo Band are Debbie Hembre on fiddle, Chris Mesford on baudron, Phil Cathy, on

bass and Kurt Mesford on guitar. While the membership of the Banjo Band varies, it is anchored by Paul who leads the band on its musical iournev.

As usual the coffeehouse will start with an open mic session at 7:30 pm. Come early or call Alan if you want a slot, because the slots sometimes fill up. The Coffeehouse is held at All Saints' Episcopal Church located at 1322 Kimball, Ave., Richland. Suggested donation at the door is \$8 general/\$6 senior and students. ## Celebrate a Life with Sea Songs

Bruce Mesford was a long-time and well-loved member of Three Rivers Folklife Society. Bruce was the major producer of nautical and traditional music events for 3RFS. He served on the 3RFS board and the Tumbleweed Music Festival Steering Committee, rounding up volunteers and homestays for visiting performers. He was also the driving force behind the Second Saturday Sea Song Singalongs for more than 10 years. After a battle with pancreatic cancer, Bruce died on November 13th, at home with his large family around him. They will be having a private service for him.

It is Bruce's wish that any memorial gifts be given to the Cancer Center in Kennewick.

During the week of his death, Bruce was still working to ensure that the next concert, Constellaton's Crew, would be a success. Bruce's family and friends will celebrate his life at Roundtable Pizza in Richland after the Constellation's Crew Concert on December 1st. Many out of town people will be there to help us celebrate Bruce and the music that he loved. This is as close to a wake as can be done. Join us in song to remember Bruce Mesford.

#### Coffeehouse Rules! Rules to Live By

Folk Talk editor, Mary Hartman, is a veteran performer and has some advice for etiquette at 3RFS open mic sessions.

1. Find out how much time you'll have, then practice! It's okay to bring a lyric and chord sheet to prevent getting up on stage and blanking out.

- 2. Please pay the donation, even if you are playing at open mic. There are expenses (hall rental, etc.) that need to get paid from these donations.
- 3. Tune your instrument before you get on stage. You can use the nursery,

- at All Saints' to the side of the stage. 4. Simple instrumentation is best. Adding amps and effects, etc. makes it tougher on the sound engineer and uses up your music time
- 5. Let the sound crew get the sound equipment set up for you. If your guitar has a pickup, they'll plug it in for you or tell you where to plug it. They'll adjust mics and do a brief sound check to make sure everything is working.

  6. Edgy politics and controversial topics
- 6. Edgy politics and controversial topics are a tradition of folk music, but our audiences are a mix of ages and sensibilities. Keep this in mind when selecting your material.
- 7. When the host tells you your time is up, say thanks and leave the stage. You can always come back the next month and play again.
- 8. Please don't leave the hall right after you finish. You may be the best since Woody Guthrie, but it's only decent to stay and listen to the other folks. And for goodness sake, don't carry on a conversation while people are performing. You want them listening to you so return the favor.
- 10. If you're uncertain about anything, just ask! Our host, Alan Page, is a really friendly guy!
