Trio Brings Humor, Harmony & Cello to 3RFS

Saturday, 21 February, 7:30 PM

Richland's acoustic trio, Humphrey, Hartman & Cameron, are just a little bit "different." Award-winning songwriting, guitar, banjo and... cello? Well, why not? The unusual combination of instruments fits right in with their songs, which blend the ridiculous and the sublime.

Janet Humphrey and Mary Hartman joined forces in the mid 1990s. Strong vocals and tight harmonies are the signature of their high energy performances. Michelle Cameron moved to town in 2003 and asked if she could bring her cello and jam with them. Two rehearsals later, they were playing gigs as a trio. Adding a third musical voice required some re-arranging of familiar tunes. "Mary and I had been singing some of these songs for 10 years," says Janet, "but Michelle made them sparkle again."

Janet is a transplanted easterner, raised on peace marches and picket signs. Her writing style reflects her diverse musical background.

Degreed in theory and composition, she's done commercial arranging, fronted a six man jugband and taught fingerstyle guitar. Janet's lyric topics run the gamut from historical ballads that explore the human condition to whimsical blues about the mundane

Mary grew up in the Midwest, learning to play John Denver songs on her guitar and banjo. Her own compositions are full of images of nature, the earthy kind and the human kind. One of Mary's songs, "Zamboni," was selected by Garrison Keillor as one of the best Christmas songs of the year. Listeners frequently remark on the clarity of Mary's strong, alto voice.

Michelle's versatility on the cello makes her equally at home as firstchair cellist with the Mid-Columbia Symphony or plucking out bass lines on bluegrass tunes. At folk festivals you'll see her and her bright red cello case flitting from stage to stage, backing up other musicians like Hank Cramer or Dan Maher. She explains, "The freedom I have as a musician

(playing folk) is wonderful. As a classically trained cellist, I usually played the dots on the page; here there are no dots! I improvise the part until we find something we like."

The group (or members thereof) have shared stages with Pete Seeger, Chervl Wheeler, Brian Bowers, David Mallet, and Leo Kottke. Humphrey and Hartman (pre-Cameron) have one CD, "On Solid Ground" and the trio released "What Turns You On?" in 2004. Michelle has nearly finished recording a CD of instrumental religious music, and Mary is also working on a Christian CD. At this concert the trio will play crowd-pleasers like "Goose Poop," "Chocolate Reverie" and "Big-Footed Woman," as well as new material.

This concert will be held at the new Community Unitarian Universalist Church, 2819 West Sylvester Street in Pasco. Tickets are \$11 general, \$9 seniors/students if purchased in advance at Bookworm stores and Octopus Garden. \$1 more at the door.

Laddie Ray Melvin and Lyle Morse are a pair of strong, solo performers from Spokane. As Melvin & Morse, they have banded together to perform acoustic roots music and originals.

Lyle Morseis an outstanding acoustic guitarist, harmonica player and stunning singer/songwriter/performer. His music has been highlighted, and performed live on National Public Radio affiliates and college radio programs

featuring blues and folk music.

Laddie Ray Melvin is a folk singer who has played music in the Pacific Northwest for years. He is a songwriter who carefully crafts his lyrics and puts them with music from the American folk tradition. Country, blues, folk and folk rock are all colors Laddie Ray works with as he sings of life, death, family, hope, and our shared humanity.

The trio of Keeler, Melvin and Morse have been great favorites at past Tumbleweed Music Festivals. Their

varied styles and voices blend into a relaxed, top-quality performance.

The Coffeehouse begins with open mic -- come early to sign up - and is held at All Saints' Episcopal Church at 1322 Kimball, Ave., Richland.

Bring on the Groundhog!

What does a big rodent have to do with the coming of spring? We found the following information on Wikipedia and at groundhog.org "In weather lore, if a groundhog emerges from its burrow on this day and fails to see its shadow because the weather is cloudy, winter will

soon end. If it is sunny and the ground-

hog sees its shadow, the groundhog
