

Sänger and Didele & Uncle Joe's & Tumbleweed

Saturday, 20 February, 7:30 PM

The Great Sänger and Didele (We love those guys!) will perform their special brand of music and mayhem for a fundraising concert to benefit **Tumbleweed Music Festival on** Saturday, February 20th. The show will be opened by one of our favorite local bands, Uncle Joe's Banjo Band.

In the past few years The Great Sänger and Didele, sometimes known as "Seamen of the Inland Empire," have become notorious on the Northwest nautical music scene. They actually got their start at the 1998 Tumbleweed Music Festival, and have rocketed to fame (but not much fortune) ever since. Known for their zany humor and their juxtaposition of goofy parody songs and beautifully executed serious nautical music, some folks have compared them to the Smothers Brothers, and yes, they are actually brothers. Locally we know them as Kent and Kurt Mesford. They grew up in Richland as members of the musical Mesford clan, but somewhere along the line

their alter-egos took over, and The Great Sänger and Didele eclipsed the humble and prosaic Mesford boys.

The mythic Sänger and Didele had a whole different history, according to their Myspace profile:

"The tale of Sänger and Didele begins some 30-odd years ago. Cleetus Sänger, heir to the famous Sänger Kazoo Company fortune, was born in a humble 47 room mansion on the outskirts of Tillesquat, Washington. A precocious child, he early showed a talent for typewriter repair and tormenting the neighborhood cats with duct tape. No one dared discipline the child, as he possessed a three-alarm scream that could bring even the largest and most macho adult male to his knees. Young Sänger therefore grew up totally convinced of his own superiority over the little people, or "scum" as he chose to call them.

Meanwhile. Homer Didele did not have such an easy life. Abandoned in the woods outside Tillesquat shortly after his birth, he was adopted by a friendly tribe of clams. When finally discovered by human beings, he was

fully grown, but had the mind of a fully grown person raised by clams. He spoke no English; his only means of communication was a rudimentary form of Basque. His transition into human society was not easy, but was aided by liberal use of electroshock therapy and frequent rewards of SPAM.

Homer was given a scholarship to the prestigious Northwest Presbyterian Dental College of Business and Agriculture, conveniently located in the heart of downtown Tillesquat. Majoring in Mineral Husbandry (with a minor in loansharking), Didele joined and was quickly made captain of the university tambourine squad. Meanwhile, Sänger was also majoring at the university. Fate decreed that the two were to meet through their mutual hobby of competitive dog grooming. It was at a meet against rival Tillesquat Women's College of Botany and Hairdressing that the pair discovered a shared love of inflicting themselves on the public. It is this love that continues to bring them to you to this very day.'

The boys have produced two CDs; "Seaman of the Inland Empire" and "The Great Sänger and Didele: Live at the Tillesquat Bowl." They have a new CD available for family and friends, which you may be able to purchase at the concert. Come out to support our local heroes and Tumbleweed Music Festival at the same time! We love those guys!

Uncle Joe's Banjo Band, who will open the show, do family-friendly old-time music. They are all from the Tri-Cities area so they are also local favorites. Paul Knight is the banjo player and sings lead vocals. Chris Mesford plays bodhrán and other percussion instruments. Kurt Mesford plays guitar, and sings some too. Jan Hylden plays flutes and whistles and Debbie Hembree fiddles as Phil Cathey thumps along on the bass. Another Raffle Guitar for TMF!

Thanks go to Jay Howlett and Blah! Blah! Woof! Woof! for once again providing Three Rivers Folklife Society with a Breedlove guitar as a raffle prize for Tumbleweed 2010. This year it is a Breedlove Retro Dreadnought. Inspired by the Breedlove Revival designs, this guitar is one of four key retro models with an ear towards tradition. These fine instruments are created with the same level of craftsmanship that have made the award winning Breedlove Atlas Series so highly regarded. The Dreadnought models are extremely quick and powerful for demanding flatpicking, bluegrass and the blues.

The Breedlove Retro Series Dreadnought/SM is a vintage orchestra model instrument with a solid Sitka spruce top, solid mahogany back and laminate sides, rosewood finger-board, ivoroid binding with herringbone top purfling, Abalone rosette, and an L.R. Baggs Stage Pro, element active pickup system with volume and tone controls. The value of this guitar is \$1049. Thanks Jay, Blah! Blah! Woof! Woof! and Breedlove.

By the way, Jay and his friends in Blah! Blah! Woof! Woof! will be performing a concert for 3RFS in April. Come out and thank them then. Meanwhile, you can start buying raffle tickets at our February concert with The Great Sänger and Didele and Uncle Joe's Banjo Band.
