

## TR Ritchie Brings Music, Words, and Art

Saturday, 16 February, 7:30 PM

TR Ritchie, based in Bellingham, writes award-winning, lyric-driven music. In fact, he is such a wordsmith that his latest project is not a collection of songs at all, but an anthology of poems and illustrations entitled "Works On Paper," compiled from a year of writing and selections from sketch books filled with pen and ink drawings accumulated during TR's long career as a traveling musician.

"Songs, poetry, drawings -- they're all part of the same thing," TR says. "A response to what I witness in the world, that's all. And there's different ways of expressing that response. Some ways don't require songs. Some don't even require words. For me, the way of art has always been more about a point of perspective than any one means of expression."

That said, these days readings from his book have become an integral part of TR's performance, and coupled with those award-winning songs they depict a distinctive artistic presence, by turns witty and insightful. Doug Bright, writing in Heritage Music Review says of TR, "(He) hits his target with a concise forcefulness that makes most other songwriters sound like poorly-designed robots."

Self-taught as a musician, TR bought his first guitar while studying journalism in college, wrote his first songs, and never looked back. For several years he divided his time learning his craft while working seasonally for the U.S. Forest Service as a fire fighter and, later, a fire lookout in the mountains of northeastern Oregon. TR eventually settled in the northwest, and in the late 70s busked on the streets of Seattle's Pike Place Market while writing the songs that would eventually become his first recording, "Not Just Another Pretty Songwriter," a cassette-only album that none theless caught the ear of regional music critics.

As time passed, songwriting awards accumulated: a two-time finalist at the Kerrville Folk Festival's "New Folk" contest; top honors from the Napa Valley (CA), Sisters (OR) and Jubilee (CO) Folk Festival songwriting competitions; the only doubleshowcase songwriter in 2001 and again in 2005 at the Walnut Valley Festival's New Artist Showcase in Kansas, and a 2005 finalist at the Mountain Stage Newsong Festival. He won the Snowbird Music Festival (UT) contest and was invited back as a main stage headliner in 2009. More CDs have followed, his most recent. 2009's "Wild Horses."

The concert will be held at the Community Unitarian Universalist Church, 2819 W. Sylvester St., Pasco. Tickets are \$11 general admission/\$9 seniors and students, if purchased in advance at Bookworm stores and Octopus' Garden and are \$1 more at the door. 3RFS members receive a \$3 discount.

## **John Bartholomew at Coffeehouse**

The headline act for February's Three Rivers Folklife Society Coffeehouse is John Bartholomew who has been a frequent open mic performer. John lives in Richland and plays an eclectic mix of musical genres; including folk, blues, Klezmer, Americana, and Hawaiian slack key, on an eclectic mix of instruments: mandolin, octave mandolin, mandola and mandocello (he has promised to leave the guitar and fiddle at home). Under the influence of many known and unknown songwriters such as John Prine, Steve

Earle, Townes Van Zandt, Slaid Cleaves, Moses Kahumoku and Joe Pug, he is sure to play a few obscure songs on obscure instruments. Despite the dozens of dollars he's made performing, it remains a hobby that he pursues when not usefully employed.

An open mic session will start the evening. Come early to sign up, if you want to perform as slots are limited. You'll find us at All Saints' Episcopal Church, 1322 Kimball Ave., in Richland. (drive around to the lower parking lot in the back) Suggested donations are \$8 for general admission or \$6 for teens and seniors at the door.

## International Mother Language Day

UNESCO's General Conference proclaimed February 21, 2000, as International Mother Language Day. This date has been observed every year to promote linguistic and cultural diversity and multilingualism. eventually resulted in the creation of Bangladesh, the first nation created in modern times based on language. This year we will observe International Mother Language Day on Sunday, 24 February.

Languages are the most powerful expressions of preserving and developing our heritage. Research shows that the use of one's mother tongue encourages linguistic and cultural diversity, promotes multilingual education, and develops awareness of solidarity based on understanding, tolerance and dialogue.

The Tri-Cities enjoys a rich, multicultural diversity. People here came not only from different parts of the country, but also from different parts of the world. The 2000 U.S. Census indicates 27 ethnicities and over 30 languages in this area. To uphold this rich diversity, we intend to celebrate the day with a cultural program where groups will commemorate their own mother language. Local groups will present a key topic of their mother language, followed by a cultural performance. The first part of each presentation will be in English.

The theme of International Mother Language Day in 2013 is "The Book." Languages play an important role in the integration process in all aspects of public life but especially education. However, thousands of the world's 6,000 languages are absent from the public arena and fifty per cent are in danger of disappearing altogether. This multicultural experience will take place in the Battelle Auditorium, on Battelle Blvd. in Richland. There is no admission charge.
