

# "Lonesome" Lyle Sings the Blues for 3RFS

Saturday, 19 January, 7:30 PM

Lyle Morse, also known as "Lonesome Lyle," is an outstanding acoustic guitarist, harmonica player and singer/ songwriter/performer who calls Eastern Washington his home. Lyle has been refining his musical vision and talents over the last four decades and currently entertains in acoustic coffee houses, bistros, restaurants, street fairs, resorts, theaters, wineries and folk and arts festivals throughout Washington, Idaho and Montana. His music has been highlighted and performed live on National Public Radio affiliates as well as commercial and college radio programs featuring blues, folk and original music. He has also performed on network television and cable TV. Lyle has performed in Three Rivers country before, often as part of the trio Keeler, Melvin and Morse.

Purely because he finds the music so expressive, moving and profound, Lyle concentrates his energies on acoustic blues music, but does venture into other forms of American roots music. Lyle's primary "soul shadows" and musical influences have been Robert Johnson, Big Bill Broonzy, Muddy Waters and Keb Mo. Lyle's sound is "groove-based" with other influences including British blues, the Chicago blues stylists, Detroit soul/rhythm & blues, country blues, folk, jazz and rock-a-billy music.

Great blues music is found in a wide variety of musical contexts, and Lyle

has incorporated this music into his performances.

Lyle has recorded 7 compact discs. His CD "No ReMorse," a collection of 13 original songs, contains "Blues as steely and intense as a scorned lover's stare, as smooth as the feel of black velvet, and as down-home as a jam session on grandma's front porch."

The concert will be held at the Community Unitarian Universalist Church, 2819 W. Sylvester St., Pasco. Tickets are \$11 general admission and \$9 for seniors and students if purchased in advance at Bookworm stores and Octopus' Garden and are \$1 more at the door. 3RFS members receive a \$3 discount.

Swing Set is a five piece jazz combo founded last year by a group of talented students from Richland High School. Swing Set performs jazz standards and big band favorites and consists of Denin Koch on guitar, Kyle Westlund on saxophone, Jeffrey Spinner on trumpet, Wyatt Wireman on bass and Lucas Winkelman on drums. Audiences around the Tri-Cities have been blown away by the musical prowess and energy these

young musicians bring to the stage. Don't miss them!

a "knot" is a unit of velocity of a ship equal to one nautical mile per hour. Did you ever wonder why sailors use the term "knot" when referring to a ship's speed? Wikipedia says "Until the mid-19th century vessel speed at sea was measured using a chip log... a wooden panel, weighted on one edge to float perpendicular to the water surface, and thus present substantial resistance to moving with respect to the water around it, attached by line

to a reel. The chip log was "cast" over the stern of the moving vessel and the line allowed to pay out. Knots placed at a distance of 47 feet 3 inches passed through a sailor's fingers, while another sailor used a 30 second sandglass (28 second sand- glass is the current accepted timing) to time the operation. The knot count would be reported and used in the sailing master's dead reckoning and navigation.' Maybe it should be "knotical" miles!
