

Adam Miller, Autoharp Virtuoso, in Concert

Saturday, 19 March, 7:30 PM

Adam Miller, one of the premier autoharpists in the world, will perform for Three Rivers Folklife Society in March. Adam is a renowned American folksinger and natural-born storyteller. An accomplished folklorist, historian, and song-collector, he has amassed an impressive repertoire of over 5,000 songs. He accompanies his rich, resonant baritone voice with lively fingerpicking acoustic guitar and stunningly beautiful autoharp melodies.

Adam's time-honored, traditional folk songs and ballads are a breath of fresh air. A masterful entertainer who never fails to get his audience singing along, he has distinguished himself as one of the great interpreters of American folk tales and folk songs, and as a performer who appeals to audiences of all ages.

"I have always had a great interest in how folk songs travel through history, and how history travels through folk songs," Adam explains.

"American history -- our collective

past -- is very much alive within us. It is a great privilege to sing with people all over the nation, and to help them locate their own place in the long stream of cultural tradition - to make those connections to their own family history. their traditions, and those old songs that are part of them."

One reviewer said of his performance, "It will charm even the most diehard of iPod-loving kids or reluctant significant-others." Folksinger Frank Hamilton, a former member of The Weavers, says, "He's doing a real service for folk music: defending the Treasury of American Tradition." George Winston calls Miller, "One of the great autoharpists and folksingers of our times." The San Francisco folknik describes Miller's autoharp playing as, "...superb and imaginative." Maine Public Radio calls him, "...a master of the autoharp." Fellow folksingers call him "a National Treasure."

Traveling 70,000 miles each year, from the Everglades to the Arctic Circle, Adam is a 21st century troubadour

with a trunk full of stories and songs rich with the wisdom, wry humor, and soulful sensibility of American wit. His songs evoke a by-gone time when most entertainment was homemade -- before radios and televisions replaced the musical instruments that once resounded in every American homestead. His songs are the songs of America's heritage; a window into the soul of our nation in its youth.

Adam has recorded four CDs that receive airplay across North America and Europe: "Bare Fingers - The Solo Autoharp Artistry of Adam Miller," "Wild Birds," "The Orphan Train and other Reminiscences," and "Along Came a Giant - Traditional American Folk Songs for Young People."

The concert will be held at the **Community Unitarian Universalist** Church, 2819 W. Sylvester, in Pasco. Tickets are \$11 general admission/\$9 seniors and students, if purchased in advance at Bookworm stores and Octopus' Garden and \$1 more at the door. 3RFS members receive \$3 off.

Coffeehouse Presents Jean Mann

Friday, 11 March, 7:30 PM

Seattle-based, alt-folk, indie-pop singer/ songwriter Jean Mann has a lot to write and sing about. Having toured extensively since releasing her first album, "Blossom" (2000), this innovative, selftaught performer shares her soulful. lovely and gritty-honest tales through the voice of an angel. Her vocal prowess, combined with eclectic instrument playing (alternately-tuned acoustic 6string and tenor guitars, harmonica

and ukulele), results in the homey, intimate feeling of sitting around a kitchen table with close friends.

Jean has released four albums since she began performing in September 1999, the very day her mother passed away. Along the road of that life-changing event, came more life, love, a stolen vintage Gibson guitar and enough broken hearts to fill a country western album. A cache of beautifully arranged songs and an empowered voice emerged through it all.

Her second release, "Seasons" (2004), brought her to Brendan Hill (Blues Traveler), who produced and played percussion on the project. In September 2009, Jean accomplished her longest road tour, circling the perimeter of the U.S. (10,000 miles), with 22 shows in 5 weeks, drawing from her entire catalogue, including her third album, "Daisies and Fire" (2007).

Adam Miller Autoharp Workshop

Sunday, 20 March, 2:00 PM

Autoharp virtuoso Adam Miller will teach a 2-1/2 hour, hands-on autoharp workshop for beginning to intermediate players. This informal workshop will develop and improve your ability to accompany singing and play familiar melodies on the autoharp.

Playing along and learning by ear, Adam will address rhythm, timing, chord selection, picks, dynamics, and a myriad of right-hand and left-hand techniques for diatonic and chromatic autoharp. Workshop song handouts (in the keys of C, F, and G major) include folk songs, waltzes, children's songs, and ballads.

Adam Miller is a renowned American folksinger and one of the most respected autoharp instructors in the country. He has conducted autoharp workshops from the Everglades to the Arctic. Adam's website is Folksinging.org

Instruments will not be provided, so each participant is encouraged to bring an autoharp. The cost is \$20 per student with a maximum of 25 participants. Jean has headlined at many Pacific Northwest festivals, and played iconic rooms such as Yoshi's lounge in San Francisco, the Tractor Tavern in Seattle, and CBGB's in New York. Her fourth CD is "Dream of Goats."
