

Dan Maher, host of Northwest Public radio's Inland Folk, and Badger Mountain Dry Band, a local bluegrass band, are paired up for a Tumbleweed Music Festival benefit concert.

Dan Maher has been the host of the Inland Folk radio show for over 30 years. The show started in Spokane and was soon picked up by Northwest Public Radio. It has expanded from one hour to three hours and airs on FM 81.9 from 11AM-2PM on Saturdays. He has also recently begun a monthly series on Northwest Public Television called "Jam with Dan," which features Dan talking and jamming with performers from all over the Northwest.

Dan is much more than a popular radio/TV show host. He is also a well-known performer throughout

the Northwest. He is known for his humor, his broad range of repertoire and his ability to get folks singing during his high-energy shows. He is a huge supporter of our Tumbleweed Music Festival, and has been emcee of the festival Saturday evening concert almost every year. He has done fundraising concerts for the festival for many years as well.

Badger Mountain Dry Band has been playing their own brand of progressive bluegrass music in the Pacific Northwest for over 25 years. Their repertoire is eclectic and ranges from bluegrass and country music standards, original and traditional gospel music, big band and swing tunes to innovative renditions of 60's rock and roll and Beatles songs. For them, any song they choose is fair game, as long as they play it on traditional bluegrass

instruments: banjo, mandolin, guitars, dobro, and bass, with an occasional fiddle thrown in for good measure.

Jim Honeyman who sings high tenor and plays mandolin and John April who does vocals, writes original gospel songs and plays banjo, guitar and dobro, are the founders of the band, whose membership has varied widely over the past 25 years. The current line-up includes Sean Hodges on guitar, mandolin and fiddle, Mike Zerbo on stand-up and electric bass, and Curt Field on vocals and guitar. The Badger Mountain Dry Band has been a regular performer at the Emerald of Siam Restaurant, and were featured performers at last year's Sacajawea Bluegrass Festival. ## Remembering Those Who Are Gone

Mike Briggs, husband of our local bestselling author Patricia Briggs, died unexpectedly on January 23. Mike and Patty lived on a horse ranch in Benton City. He was a former IT guy who in the past few years has devoted himself to running the ranch, and being Patty's number one fan, website manager, and editor. He and Patty did workshops at Tumbleweed on filk music and superstitions about vampires, werewolves and witches, etc., and were sometimes special guests at our Second Saturday Sea Song Singalongs. Mike will be greatly missed by all who knew him, but especially by Patty who we keep in our thoughts and prayers.

Phil Williams, pioneering musician, promoter, and Pacific Northwest record company owner, died on February 16. He had been ill for some time and was 80 years old when he died.

His was a familiar face in bluegrass and old-time music circles, performing since the mid-1960s with a variety of groups, often with his wife, Vivian Williams, a champion fiddler. They left behind many recordings with their bluegrass group Tall Timber, and as a duo performing as Vivian and Phil Williams. Starting in 1967, they also ran Voyager Records, releasing their own recordings and collections of traditional and historical fiddle music of the United States. Voyager published a range of instructional materials as well, including tune books and workshop materials for teaching mandolin and fiddle.

Phil developed a reputation as a first-rate audio engineer, and published a number of articles in professional journals. He was also a co-founder of the Seattle Folklife Society and the Northwest Folklife Festival, which has drawn large crowds to Seattle since 1971. People in the Northwest will remember Phil for his tremendous generosity and love for the music and the people who played it. Phil and Vivian Williams played for the first contra dance at Tumbleweed Music Festival in 1997 and also in 2015.
