

Tumbleweed Benefit Concert in May

Saturday, 3 May, 7:30 PM

Three musical acts with a long presence in the Eastern Washington folk scene will share the bill in a concert to benefit Tumbleweed Music Festival 2014: Dan Maher, Humphrey, Hartman & Cameron, and Badger Mountain Dry Band.

Dan Maher is a singer, "song finder," and radio personality from Pullman known and loved by many in 3RFS country. Dan originally fell in love with folk music as a teenager growing up in Spokane. His love for folk eventually led to his involvement with public radio as the host of the weekly three-hour folk music radio show, Inland Folk, which he has hosted for over 30 years. He is producer, editor and engineer for the show.

In concert, Dan may take a brief detour through a gnarly Dylan imitation or a snippet of '70s pop before settling in to a traditional Irish ballad. One thing is certain about a Dan Maher performance: there WILL be some sing-alongs!

What do you get when you cross a

guitar, a banjo, and a cello? Humphrey, Hartman & Cameron, a trio of local women who love music and humor in equal measure. They are the harmonic equivalent of peanut butter, jelly, and bananas: distinctly different and perfectly complementary.

Janet Humphrey has a degree in music theory and composition, and has done commercial arranging, fronted a six-man jugband and taught fingerstyle guitar. Janet's lyric topics run the gamut from historical ballads that explore the human condition to whimsical blues about the mundane.

Mary Hartman finds inspiration in the sublime and the ridiculous... perhaps that is why she plays both guitar and banjo. Her award-winning songs cover topics from love and mercy to goose poop and rear-end "cleavage."

Michelle Cameron is versatile on the cello, sometimes lyrical, sometimes rhythmic, always interesting. The cello often provides a third voice to Janet and Mary's alto tones. Michelle often does double duty, finding unique ways to make her cello sound like bagpipes or jazz sax.

Badger Mountain Dry Band is a progressive band using acoustic/bluegrass instruments to arrange traditional and popular music providing an eclectic blend. Playing traditional bluegrass instrumentation, the group has presented a music ranging from traditional bluegrass standards, original Gospel material, 60s rock and roll, swing tunes, big band tunes, old country standards, and more.

Long-time members include Jim Honeyman (vocals, mandolin), John April (vocals, banjo, guitar, and now dobro), and Chuck Peden (vocals, guitar). The band has a couple of new members: Obediah DeWeber (vocals, red-hot guitar, fiddle), and Mike Zabel (stand-up bass, electric bass).

The concert will be held at the Battelle Auditorium, Battelle Blvd., Richland. Tickets are \$11 general admission/\$9 seniors and students if purchased in advance at Bookworm stores and Octopus' Garden and are \$1 more at the door. \$3 off for 3RFS members. All proceeds after expenses will benefit Tumbleweed Music Festival, helping keep it free.

Membership Concert Features Carl Allen

Terri Andre, Member at Large. Terri lives in Kennewick and is Education **Director for the Kennewick Community** Schools. She also worked at CREHST Museum. A long-time Tumbleweed volunteer, she has been the publicity chair, her favorite job being a button seller at the festival.

Latino Music From Humanities WA!

Music is a vital part of our culture and Humanities Washington has two upcoming presentations of interest to Three Rivers folk: a hands-on session on Latino musical influences, and a return of regional favorite Hank Cramer on the Oregon Trail.

Mapping Latino Musical Migrations will be Thursday, May 15, 7:00 PM, at the Richland Public Library. Antonio Davidson-Gómez will show us that pop songs run deeper than their catchy lyrics might suggest. The instruments, the language, the style - even a song's structure can show us how ideas and experiences are traded among diverse communities. In this hands-on experience, participants will play instruments from U.S. Latino and Latin American traditions and literally "connect the dots" on a map to see how Latinos have contributed to popular music in the U.S. "Latin" styles such as salsa, Tejano, reggaetón and Latina and Latino's integral contributions to rock 'n' roll, hip-hop, and country will be explored.
