
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Lulu LaFever Lives Up to Her Name

Saturday, 19 November 7:30 PM

Grammy member Lulu LaFever delivers red-hot swing, sultry blues, and smoother-than-black-velvet jazz with incredible talent and originality. She lives up to every expectation of a performer named Lulu LaFever.

In 1994 Lulu received a grant from the Oregon Arts Commission for her talent as a songwriter and singer. She began work on her first CD and left her career as a registered nurse to pursue her dream to show off and share her music with the world. Six CDs and over 16 years of touring later, it proved to be the right move. As Lulu always says "Life is soooo good! Don't just take the scenic route, be the scenic route." Lulu has been compared to Ella Fitzgerald, Bette

Midler, Cindy Lauper and Bonnie Raitt, but she most definitely has a style all her own. As a songwriter and composer Lulu creates new boundaries in the world of music. Lulu and her band The Hot Tamales have had the honor of opening for Willie Nelson and Big Bad VooDoo Daddy. Whether solo or with her band Lulu is what the world needs: a good time! At this concert, Hot Tamales member Jon Lindahl will back up Lulu.

Lulu's website shares a bit of her philosophy: "The Tao of Lulu... Calling all hopeless romantics...the one thing we all have in common is that we will fall in and out of love... even with ourselves. There really is an artist's light in everyone and everyone has a story...As soon as we

get over the rules of what our culture mandates we find a culture and a voice of our own. That restless feeling inside is the artist in all of us trying to emerge. Lulu thinks that the really restless people in the world, including kids, must have some amazing art trying to get out. Her songs are the stories of the people she has met on the road...They have changed how she looks at the world. It is not them and us...It is in fact, all of us."

Lulu will share her art with us at the Community Unitarian Universalist Church, 2819 W. Sylvester St., Pasco. Tickets are \$11 general admission/\$9 seniors and students if purchased in advance at Bookworm stores and Octopus' Garden and are \$1 more at the door. 3RFS members receive a \$3 discount.

Coffeehouse Features Tom Rawson

Tom Rawson has made frequent appearances in 3RFS country -- at our coffeehouse, concerts, and as a regular performer at Tumbleweed Music Festival. Tom shares many characteristics with the great Pete Seeger: he plays a long-neck banjo, tells a lot of stories, sings great songs, leads singalongs with enthusiasm, and ticks off a few audience members with his political views. As Hank Cramer said "Enter Tom Rawson. Witty, energetic, and armed with banjo, lap dulcimer, and guitar, he takes the stage to warm applause from the crowd... Tom and this audience are made for each other. They know lots of songs and heck, they'll sing along even when you don't ask them to. I've seen some performers taken aback by this. Not Tom. ...He teases them, singing one called "This is NOT a sing along!" You got it: they sing along anyway" Victory Review, March 2002.

Tom has taught in pre-school and primary grades in the Seattle area for 24 years. He performs regularly at children's concerts, libraries, and folk festivals. He does workshops for educators on ways to use folk tales and the art of storytelling as an integral part of a whole-language reading curriculum. "Tom Rawson is the jack of all trades...a wonderful per-

former, excellent musician, storyteller, and teacher. His friendliness and overall demeanor put the children at ease with music and telling stories. I was amazed to see what my children could do after only 30 minutes with Tom," said Shannon Weber, an elementary school teacher in Illinois.

There will be an open mic session to start off the evening. Come early to sign up, if you want to perform. Slots are limited. The coffeehouse is held at All Saints Episcopal Church, 1312 Kimball Avenue, in Richland (drive around to the lower parking lot in the back). A Little 'Turkey in the Straw' History!

The traditional American folk tune, "Turkey in the Straw" was originally called "Zip Coon" and was performed in the early 19th century by black face performers. Several different musicians claimed authorship and we'll probably never know the true origin. The earliest lyrics were written by Dan Bryant and published in 1861.

Turkey in de straw, turkey in de hay Turkey in de straw, turkey in de hay Roll 'em up an' twist 'em up a high tuc-ka-haw

An' twist 'em up a tune called Turkey in the Straw

Another traditional version has the following lyrics.

Turkey in the hay, in the hay, in the hay. Turkey in the straw, in the straw, in the straw.

Pick up your fiddle and rosin your bow. And put on a tune called Turkey in the Straw.

Just for fun, you can fit other lyrics to

the same tune. Micki Perry manages to sing "A Visit from St. Nickolas" ('twas the night before Christmas) to this tune. Try "Stopping by Woods on a Snowy Evening" or "The Raven" for a twisted mix.

Definitively Contra!

Somebody overheard a dancer describe a contra dance as, "A rave for grownups where the drug of choice is ibuprofen." It turns out there are many ways of describing what contra dance is (and is not).

We found a wonderful collection of definitions on the Santa Barbara Country Dance Society's website (sbcds.org):

Contra dance is a form of dance that thrusts a different person of the opposite sex into your arms every 30 seconds or so. Actually, this is only true sometimes. It might be more prudent, but less whimsical, to say that contra dance is one of the few dance forms where by the end of the evening you are likely to have danced with everyone.

Contra dancing is not the same as country line dancing [we might add: no Achy Breaky Heart].

Contra dance groups receive absolutely no funding from Oliver North.

We do not wear costumes (except on Halloween) or any particular style of clothes.

A contra dance is like an amusement park ride we make for ourselves.

Contra dancing is social interaction, meeting people, and making new friends, set to music. The rest is just details.
