

## **November Concert Features Tracy Spring**

Friday, 16 November, 7:30 PM

Tracy Spring, singer/songwriter from Bellingham, displays rich, compelling vocals and versatile guitar playing. She's a writer of 3-minute novels, poetry, and music all rolled into one. Her wide musical range is demonstrated by the women she's been compared to: Sarah McLachlan, Tracy Chapman, kd lang, and Yo Yo Ma's cello.

An award-winning songwriter and seasoned performer, Tracy has played in folk venues and festivals throughout North America and Australia. Combining folk, blues, old R&B, and jazz influences, she displays a style all her own.


Tracy recently completed a five week tour of Southeast Alaska and the Yukon Territory, where she debuted a new guitar built especially for her by Rob Goldberg from Haines, Alaska. This masterfully built instrument features a small body with a big sound, with a longer scale to keep string tension elevated for the slack tunings she uses, as well as adding power to the instru-

ment. The instrument also features stunning totemic inlays designed and created by Goldberg in mother of pearl, abalone, blue glass, and green mirrored glass. The appearance, musical quality and clarity of this guitar are exceptional.

Tracy's songs "Sometimes Angels,"
"Somebody's Child" (co-written with
Becca Christel), "In Our Hands," and
"What Would You Give To Change
the World" have been used for soundtracks promoting philanthropy, raising funds for thousands of charitable
organizations. In addition to these
humanitarian anthems, she co-wrote
(with Janis Carper and Becca Christel)
"Of This World," recorded by Peter,
Paul & Mary on their 2004 studio
album, "In These Times."

Tracy is currently touring to promote her latest album, "Looking Forward-Looking Back," a collection of reflective songs ranging from expressive finger-style ballads to rockin' bottleneck blues. In a review written for the Folk & Acoustic Music Exchange by Mark Horn, "Tracy Spring sizzles with passion and is steamier than an August night in New Orleans." and "Songwriting is only half the story. Tracy Spring sports an astounding vocal range with rich tone and exquisite phrasing. The result is an album that is as musically persuasive as its lyrics are engaging. "

Tracy will perform at the Community Unitarian Universalist Church, 2819 W. Sylvester St., Pasco. Tickets are \$11 general admission and \$9 for seniors and students if purchased in advance at Bookworm stores and Octopus' Garden and are \$1 more at the door. 3RFS members receive a \$3 discount.



## **Steve Cary Performs at Coffeehouse**

Steve Cary, a well-known local singer/songwriter and guitarist has been performing since he was 5 years old, and writing music since he was 14. With a broad variety of influences – Folk-Rock to Latin, Big Band to Reggae– he calls his musical blend "Free Range Fusion." Steve grew up in Corvallis, Oregon, singing every

kind of music he could in choirs, bands, and as a soloist. He has performed classical, swing, jazz, folk, rock, and spirituals throughout the West Coast. Fluent in Spanish, he writes in both English and Spanish some songs in both. When he's not performing solo, you can hear Steve around town with the eclectic rock band Romagossa Blu.

Befora Steve's performance, there

will be an open mic session to start off the evening. Slots are limited, so come early to sign up, if you want to perform. The coffeehouse is held at All Saints' Episcopal Church, 1312 Kimball Ave., in Richland (drive around to the lower parking lot in the back). Sailor lingo lesson

Bung hole: This sounds nasty, but it isn't. It's simply a hole in a barrel to get at the stuff inside. The bung is the
