



Jeff Knoch Performs in November

Saturday, 15 November, 7:30 PM

Jeff Knoch, a many-time finalist, and two-time first-place winner of the prestigious Tumbleweed Music Festival songwriting contest is bringing his songs to the Three Rivers Folklife Society concert stage. A frequent finalist in the contest, he often won 2nd, 3rd or people's choice until he finally won 1st in 2012 for his song, "Bridges," and then again for "Only a Game" in 2014.

When he is asked what he would have you know about himself, Jeff says, "Tell them I play guitar and sing." There is much more to Jeff than that. He started playing and singing at age 13 and just never stopped.

"Tell them I write songs." Songs that have been sung and recorded by

other artists, won contests, and share the unique perspective of a consummate musician and writer. Most of Jeff's songs are humorous looks at everyday situations like waiting in line at the DMV, washing dishes or playing golf. He also writes about love and relationships

"I'm a soloist at heart." Jeff only performs alone and has elevated the art. He prefers the intimacy and spontaneity of a show that can change with the moment.

"Tell them that even though I don't play many shows these days, I love it." Audience members can tell when a performer is just going through the motions. On the other hand, Jeff engages the audience, bringing them with him on this, his latest roller-coaster ride of ballads and wacky tunes.

"Tell them I'm a showman." Jeff has a way of making every performance an unforgettable experience for each audience member. They never know what's coming next!

Seeing Jeff in concert is definitely an experience you won't want to miss. His vocal range and style instantly endear him to any listener, while his wit and humor keep you smiling and laughing.

Coffeehouse Brings in Laddie Ray Melvin

Friday, 14 November, 7:30 PM

Laddie Ray Melvin is a folksinger who has played music in the Pacific Northwest for many years. He carefully crafts his lyrics and surrounds them with music from the American folk tradition. Country, blues, folk and folk-rock are all colors this mature artist works with as he sings of life, death, family, love, hope and our shared humanity.

Laddie Ray has produced four independently recorded CDs since 2001. The first album was "Rocky Ground," a personal journey, the second was "In The Aftermath," a collection of tunes that considers what it means to

be human in times of trouble. Laddie Ray's third CD was "A City Glows In The Distance." This is a collection of songs that are intentionally spare, each a live take, and the stories these songs tell are about how the way the characters in them see the world they inhabit. On his most recent album, "The Wheel" fron 2012, each song finds its place in time only to be brought into now, a new place in time that describes the constancy of change.

As one reviewer wrote, "Laddie Ray Melvin's songs are like a well-worn heirloom quilt woven together from threads of traditional Americana, country, blues and a bit of Dylan-esque folk rock. His voice is weathered and

rich, and his songs are dusty landscapes of life experience written from the perspective of a mature soul." (Get Out! North Idaho: July 2007) Check him out at his web site at www.laddieraymelvin.com

Before Laddie Ray begins his performance at the coffehouse, there will be an open mic session to start off the evening. Come early to sign up if you want to perform because slots are limited. The coffeehouse is held at All Saints Episcopal Church, 1312 Kimball Ave., in Richland (drive around to the lower parking lot in the back). Suggested donations are \$8 general admission or \$6 for teens and seniors at the door.

As I stood there, I thanked God for the path my life has taken over these years, and silently thanked all the Tumbleweed volunteers - both musicians and music aficionados - for making that experience possible." Our friends in Spokane put on a dynamite folk festival each year. This will be the 19th annual. Like Tumbleweed, it is run by volunteers and supported by sponsors and donors, so there is no admission charge. The Fall Folk Festival's mission is to present the diversity of the community through traditional music, dance and the arts. Diversity is definitely a strong point of this festival!

Just a few of the different types of music: ancient Russian polyphonic folk song, traditional Hawaiian and Polynesian dances, Japanese Taiko drum, dance and martial arts, sounds of Zimbabwe, Irish Dance, original folk, Americana, western/cowboy, Native American songs and flute, swing and jazz, bluegrass, and blues.

The festival runs from 11:00 AM to 10:00 PM Saturday and 11:00 AM to 5:00 PM Sunday. It's held at Spokane Community College (The Lair), 1810 N. Greene Street, Spokane. There's plenty of free parking. For more information, including driving directions, see http://spokanefolkfestival.org.

In Robert Louis Stevenson's <u>Treasure</u> Island, pirate Billy Bones sings a sea chantey in the Admiral Benbow Inn: "Fifteen men on the dead man's chest-

- .. Yo-ho-ho, and a bottle of rum! Drink and the devil had done for the rest--
- ..Yo-ho-ho, and a bottle of rum!" Did you know this song is not a traditional sea chantey? Stevenson wrote the chorus just for the novel, and others expanded the poem later and set it to music. Treasure Island was published in 1883, so perhaps it qualifies as a "traditional chantey" after all!

It's unlikely you'll find a dead man's chest or a bottle of rum at Round Table Pizza in Richland, but there will be plenty of sea chanteys! We'll gather around 7:00 PM and there is no cost except for the food and beverages.
