

## **Guitar Raffle Continues**

We are continuing to sell raffle tickets for the Breedlove guitar to help pay the bills for this year's Tumbleweed Music Festival. The prize is a Breedlove Atlas AJ250/SF Plus Jumbo Acoustic-Electric. Features include a deep

# **'October Winds' Bring Bill Staines Back!**

Saturday, 17 October, 7:30 PM

Our October concert pairs a veteran singer/songwriter/storyteller from the Northeast with a young, up-and-coming counterpart from the Northwest. For decades, Bill Staines has traveled back and forth across North America, singing his songs and delighting audiences. 3RFS counts on him returning every year or so in the fall.

Staines started his career in the early 1960s in the Cambridge, Massachusetts, area. He began touring nationwide a few years later. In 1975 he won the National Yodeling Championship at the Kerrville Folk Festival. Performing about 200 times a year, he has been on APrairie Home Companion, The Good Evening Show, and Mountain Stage.

Singing mostly his own songs, Bill has become one of the most popular singers on the folk music circuit today. "Bill Staines is one of our very best folk and country singer/songwriters. He's a New Englander who dreams

of open plains and vast, Western skies, and damn his soul, he writes better cowboy songs than anybody in the Southwest." - The Houston Post. Bill weaves a magical blend of wit and humor into his performances. His most notable songs include "The Roseville Fair," "Crossing the Water," "A Place in the Choir," and "Child of Mine."

His songs have been recorded by many artists including, Peter, Paul, & Mary, Nanci Griffith, Mason Williams, Glenn Yarborough, Jerry Jeff Walker, and Schooner Fare. Staines has recorded twenty-two albums, fifteen still in print as of 2005; and has published four songbooks, If I Were AWord, Then I'd Be A Song; River; Music To Me: The Songs of Bill Staines, and All God's Critters Got A Place In The Choir. In 2004 his memoir, The Tour: A Life Between the Lines, was published.

Bill currently lives on the seacoast of New Hampshire with his wife, son, and his cocker spaniel. His son also pursues a career as a folk performer.

Wes Weddell, a young singer/songwriter from Seattle, will open this show. Wes has become a favorite at our Tumbleweed Music Festival, having won the songwriting contest in 2006 and emceed the contest for the past few years. In 2001, when he was a college junior, Wes captivated the Northwest with his ambition to chronicle the lives of contemporary Washington State residents in song. In sixty-five days he produced nine regionally-themed songs based on stories he encountered in communities everywhere from Mossyrock to Toppenish.

The concert will be held at the Community Unitarian Universalist Church, 2819 W. Sylvester Street in Pasco. Tickets are \$11 general/\$9 seniors and students when purchased in advance at Bookworm stores, and Octopus' Garden. \$1 more at the door. 3RFS members receive a \$3 discount. If you're not a member, join at the concert and receive the discount!

# **Jesse Campos Returns to Coffeehouse**

Friday, 9 October, 7:30 PM

Walla Walla musician Jesse Campos describes his music as a spiritual blend of Santana with the presence of the Blue Mountains. Jesse can be found performing at different venues throughout southeastern Washington. "I love playing music, I get to meet other musicians and a lot of interesting people." He describes himself as having been a closet musician for a long time. "Playing music at that time (as a young man) was just for fun." Jesse praises his music instructor, gui-

tarist Corbin King, for giving him a crash course in the art form. Locally, he has a strong network of friends and musicians that give him inspiration and creativity. At this point he has recorded several CDs, and enough material for several more. Most of the songs he writes are for acoustic guitar. Jesse says we're once again on the verge of a change in music. "I believe music is going to shed itself again. It will boil down to the basics. That's where my music comes in, acoustic is very basic." According to Jesse, it's the inspiration, the spirit, from the heart,

through the hands to the guitar. Jesse impressed new fans this year

at Tumbleweed Music Festival with his band, Blue Mountain Spanish Sound.

The Coffeehouse will start with an open mic -- come early to sign up, or call Alan Page at 943-5662. The Coffeehouse is held at All Saints' Episcopal Church located at 1322 Kimball Ave., Richland (drive around to the lower parking lot in the back).
