



Humor and Heart in Concert

Saturday, 17 October, 7:30 PM

Jess McKeegan and Mark Iler are the duo Humor and Heart, playing everything from old pop songs and folk classics to Celtic tunes and sea chanteys. You may have heard them at the 2015 Tumbleweed Music Festival, and now they are returning for a CD release concert celebrating Mark's debut album: "It's About Time."

In her professional life, Jessica McKeegan Jensen is the owner and Senior Attorney of Jessica Jensen Law, a full service law firm practicing civil law with an emphasis in Collaborative Law, located in Olympia. In her musical life, she is known as Jess McKeegan, a singing musician who also plays the Irish whistle, guitar and mandolin. Jess enjoys singing some of the more "bawdy" pub type songs as well as the sad, beautiful laments of Ireland. As a Celtic Session player, Jess excels at playing the Irish whistle (also

known as the Penny Whistle or Tin Whistle) for Jigs, Reels, Aires, Marches and Slip-Jigs.

In her younger days in Philadelphia, Jess started out playing guitar and singing at local coffeehouses, then a bit later, she spent a few years singing and playing flute in a funk and disco band. It was in the clubs of Philly that she honed her skills as a front person for a band and learned the finer points of a good stage presence while performing live musical shows.

Mark Iler is a gifted singer/songwriter, instrumental sideman, show host and sound engineer. Originally from Detroit, Michigan, Mark has lived in the Puget Sound area for over twenty-five years. He holds a degree in television production and a certificate in sound recording, and operates his own professional audio services company, Grey Hawk Productions.

Mark is equally at ease in front of the microphone. He also performs throughout the Pacific Northwest as a solo act accompanying his wry acoustic folkrock/popular/humor ballads on guitar, tenor guitar and harmonica. He is also in demand as a studio session musician and live concert sideman, appearing with, among others, the Kevin Jones Band, and Constellation's Crew. For years, Mark has appeared on many (many!) of Hank Cramer's CDs. This fall Mark has released the appropriately titled CD, "It's About Time." The album is a collection of all original material that he's written over the years and has finally put together for his first ever CD.

Humor and Heart will be performing in the Community Unitarian Universalist Church, 2819 W. Sylvester St., in Pasco. Tickets are available at the Bookworm store in Kennewick, Octopus' Garden and at the door for \$14 general admission and \$12 for seniors, students, and 3RFS members.

Blue Mountain Spanish Sound

Three Rivers Folklife Society is featuring the return of Blue Mountain Spanish Sound for the September Coffeehouse. This acoustic guitar duo made up of Jesse Campos and Lance Smith hails from the Walla Walla Valley. Both are popular performers there and in the Tri-Cities, appearing at wineries and coffehouse venues. Blue Mountain Spanish Sound performs high-energy Latin acoustic music that is mostly original mixed with traditional mate-

rial. After an appearance on Good Morning Northwest KVEW TV ABC, Jason Valentine noted "They have the fastest fingers in the Northwest."

The evening will start with an open mic session. Come early to sign up if you want to perform, because slots are limited. The coffeehouse is held at All Saints' Episcopal Church, 1312 Kimball Ave., Richland (drive around to the lower parking lot in the back). Suggested donations are \$8 for general admission or \$6 for teens and seniors at the door.

Washington Music History Lecture

Thursday, 15 October, 7:00 PM

The music of artistic giants and Washington sons Bing Crosby, Jimi Hendrix, and Kurt Cobain spans generations. Washington state holds the unique position of being on 'the edge of the world' from both musical and geographic standpoints. This placement provided a rich breeding ground for three distinct and revolutionary artists who pushed artistic and technological limits to forge new musical and cultural territory.

In this captivating presentation, musical journalist Amanda Wilde highlights unusual and universal themes and threads that weave three distinct artists with three groundbreaking musical eras: the 1930s, the 1960s and the 1990s. Along the way she will show how they have influenced the technology, business, and notoriety of Washington state.

The presentation will be held at the Richland Public Library as part of the Community Lecture Series, brought to us by the Humanities Washington, the Arts and Humanities Division at Columbia Basin College, and sponsored by the Richland Public Library. Ticket Prices Change

After much debate, discussion, and input from Three Rivers Folklife Society members at our Annual Meeting, the 3RFS Board made the decision to raise concert ticket prices beginning in September. General admission prices will be \$14, while senior, student and member prices will be \$12. We will no longer be able to offer double discounts for seniors who are members and we will no longer have \$1 discounts for advance sales. Tickets will still be sold at the Bookworm store in Kennewick and Octopus' Garden in Richland as well as at the door at the same prices. We hope these changes will not adversely affect attendance at our concerts, but they are necessary to boost concert income which has been diminishing partly because of all the discounts we had been offering. A 3RFS concert is still a bargain compared to concert prices for big name entertainers and we get to be upfront and personal with our performers. who are, after all, just folks like us.
