



Larry Murante in Concert

Saturday, 21 October, 7:30 PM

It's no surprise that Seattle-based Larry Murante has gained a reputation as one of the finest contemporary singer/songwriters to emerge from the Northwest in recent years. His beautifully woven stories about every day folks, set to song, combine compassionate, socially conscious lyrics and a joyful, energetic folk/rock style. Jackson Brown, Lyle Lovett, Michael McDonald, and Hal Ketchum are all reflected in his music. Larry is known for his soaring, mellifluous, tenor, a strong rhythmic guitar style and an engaging stage presence.

Larry grew up in the small rural town of Nazareth, Pennsylvania (also the home of Martin Guitars). In high school, Larry began singing in working bands of every kind. "In my late teens I was singing in a wedding band that performed a variety of styles including jazz, pop, swing, R&B and top-40," he recalls. "In those early years I was also singing in rock cover bands and playing in top-40 groups in town on the weekends. And when I wasn't doing that, I was listening to and playing acoustic folk rock music. My biggest influence from that period (and even today) were the early 70's singer/songwriters like James Taylor, Joni Mitchell, CSNY, the Eagles and Jackson Browne."

Larry Murante tours nationally, performing at folk concerts, festivals, and house concerts. Larry's three CD releases, Point of Entry (2009), Water's Edge (2000), and Kiss Me One More Time (1994), have garnered critical acclaim from all over the country and parts of Europe. In the past few years

he's racked up a string of national and regional songwriting awards and honors including Kerrville's New Folk competition, West Coast International Song Contest, The Great American Song Contest, The John Lennon Songwriting Contest, as well as first place in our very own 1998 and 2002 Tumbleweed Festival Songwriting Contests.

Larry has shared the stage with such artists as Peter Mulvey, Cosy Sheridan, Laura Love, Michael McNevin, Darcie Deaville, TR Ritchie, Jim Page, Dave Nachmanoff, Orville Johnson, Lisa Koch, Heidi Muller, and Janis Carper. Larry's voice today is a testament not only to good pipes but to years of training — logging over a decade of study with opera, jazz, and musical theater stylists. Lawrence Huntley at the Coffeehouse

Friday, 13 October, 7:30PM

Lawrence Huntley will be the featured musician at the Three Rivers Folklife Society Coffeehouse this month. He began his music career playing the hammer dulcimer in 1982 when he realized he could apply the percussion skills he had practiced since he was 10 to quickly become an accomplished player of the instrument. Lawrence is well-known in the Tri-Cities as a virtuoso hammer dulcimer player. For many years he was a street musician and professional busker in Portland, where he played regularly at the Rose Garden and Burnside Market. He was also part of the Whamadiddle Dingbats and The Cascadia Folk Quartet.

He moved to the Tri-Cities to be a

conductor on the Burlington Northern Railroad, but he is back to being a professional musician, now based in Clarkston, WA. He returns to the Tri-Cities to play at the Emerald of Siam, local wineries, the Merrie Greenwood Faire, Sacajewea Bluegrass Festival, and our 3RFS Coffeehouse. His repertoire ranges from traditional American fiddle tunes and Celtic aires, to ragtime, calypso, reggae, salsa and South American tunes, with some originals thrown in for good measure.

Lawrence explores the traditional music and rhythms from many of the different cultures where the hammer dulcimer can be found. He also plays original melodies and shares the history of the tunes as well as stories of life as an itinerant musician. During an evening he has been know to spread rumors, fabricate facts and occasionally answer his phone.

Lawrence has performed for thousands of public and private engagements throughout the Pacific Northwest and beyond. He has appeared on many albums and has provided music for films and television programming.

The evening will start with an open mic session. Come early if you want to perform because slots are limited. The coffeehouse is held at All Saints' Episcopal Church, 1312 Kimball Ave., Richland, WA (drive around to the lower parking lot in the back). Suggested donations are \$8 for general admission or \$6 for teens and seniors at the door.

Get to Know The Hammer Dulcimer

To most modern Americans, the hammered dulcimer is new and unfamiliar. Even people who know much about American music often confuse the hammered dulcimer with the three- or four-stringed "mountain" or "plucked" dulcimer, although the two have nothing in common except their name.

The hammered dulcimer probably originated in the Middle East about 900 A.D. and is related to the much older psaltery. It spread from there across North Africa and was brought into Europe by the Spanish Moors during the 12th century A.D. It is possible that hammered dulcimers were played even earlier than this in Ireland, where they were called "tympanons."

Throughout the late Middle Ages and the Renaissance, the dulcimer remained a popular instrument in both eastern and western Europe.

It is unclear when the first hammered dulcimer was brought to America, but the earliest reference to its use in this country comes from Judge Samuel Sewall who wrote of seeing one played in Salem, Massachusetts, in 1717.

Hammered dulcimers are particularly interesting because, unlike the piano,

dulcimers were often built at home, or in small shops and factories, hence tended to reflect differing regional and personal folk styles. Why the dulcimer virtually disappeared during the first half of the 20th century is something of a mystery, but possibly it was due to competition from the more fashionable piano. Fortunately, this beautiful instrument is now enjoying a revival. For the first time in many years, new dulcimers are being built, and there is an increasing number of new players.
