Jesse Campos, New at Coffeehouse

Walla Walla musician Jesse Campos will kick off the Three Rivers Folklife Society's Coffeehouse Concert series. Jesse describes his music as a spiritual blend of Santana with the presence of the Blue Mountains.

Jesse can be found performing at different venues throughout southeastern Washington. "I love playing music, I get to meet other musicians and a lot of interesting people." However he describes himself as having been a closet musician for a long time. "Playing music at that time (as a young man) was just for fun." Jesse praises his music instruc-

tor, guitarist Corbin King, for giving him a crash course in the art form.

Locally, he has a strong network of friends and musicians that give him inspiration and creativity. He's recently been working with Lance Smith. "He's another passionate guitar player," Jesse says.

At this point he has recorded several CDs, another in the works and enough material for several more. Most of the songs he writes are for acoustic guitar. Jesse says we're once again on the verge of a change in music. "I believe music is going to shed itself again. It will boil down to the basics. That's where my music comes in, acoustic is very

basic." According to Jesse, it's the inspiration, the spirit, from the heart, through the hands to the guitar.

Joel Mabus is a maverick in the folk music world. He defies any easy pigeonhole. By turns, he picks a mountain banjo to accompany an ancient ballad, sings a witty song about modern life, plays a sweet Irish melody on guitar, swings a hot jazz number, and then reaches deep for a soulful expression of values in a troubled world. Then he tops it all off with a fiddle tune or old Carter family song -- all skillfully blended into a seamless flow. One fan said, "Its music from the heart that hits you right between the eyes."

A mainstay on the folk circuit for 30 years, Joel has 18 albums to his credit; the latest is "The Banjo Monologues." Joel will perform one night only at 3 City Sports Bar and Grill, 900 W.
