

The Wanderers Wind up at Three Rivers

Saturday, 19 September, 7:30 PM

This year, The Wanderers celebrate 50 years of singing together!!! Carl Allen and Bill Murlin met in a folk trio at Washington State University at Pullman in 1959. After winning a campus talent show, the trio, at that time, including Al Hansen, appeared regularly at campus dances and fraternal functions. The trio split up after graduation from college, but Carl and Bill started singing together again a few years later.

Bill and Carl revived the Columbia River songs written by Woody Guthrie during his one-month visit to Portland, Oregon in May of 1941. Bill recovered Guthrie's 26 Northwest songs and

published them in the "Columbia River Collection" songbook. He also produced an album containing 17 of Woody's recordings of those songs. Some of the newly published songs had never been seen or heard until they were released in 1987. Bill and Carl have presented the Guthrie songs and their stories since 1985. Carl presents a solo, first-person impersonation of Guthrie discussing his Columbia River songs, through the "Inquiring Minds Series" of Humanities Washington. Carl has also done the musical sound tracks for three public television documentaries for KCTS-TV Channel 9, Seattle.

The Wanderers feature folk songs from the 1950s to today. They focus

on good harmonies backed with wellblended guitars and banjo, and they love it when you sing along!

The concert will be held at the new Community Unitarian Universalist Church, 2819 W. Sylvester Street in Pasco. Tickets are \$11 general/\$9 seniors and students, when purchased in advance at Bookworm stores and Octopus' Garden. \$1 more at the door. 3RFS members receive a \$3 discount.



It's the 13th for Tumbleweed Music Festival!

Saturday-Sunday, 5-6 September

The 13th Annual Tumbleweed Music Festival will be held at Richland's Howard Amon Park and in the Richland Community Center. There are 4 outdoor stages, an indoor dance stage, plus an open mic stage. The music at Tumbleweed runs the gamut of acoustic genres: blues, bluegrass, traditional, ethnic, nautical, jazz, old-time, contemporary, and "alternative." There are also lots of dance groups, participatory dance, family-friendly entertainment, local and regional arts and crafts, and food vendors.

There will be about 100 different acts at the festival, which is free from 11:00 AM until 7:00 PM each day. There's a Saturday evening concert with an affordable ticket price of \$8 general

admission and \$5 seniors and students.

Concert headliners are singer/songwriter Larry Murante, Celtic band Watch the Sky!, Appalachian singers Elizabeth and Sandy LaPrelle, and the nautical duo Shanghaied on the Willamette.

Tumbleweed Music Festival is a participatory experience for all. An open mic stage, hosted by our friends in Mid-Columbia Traditional Arts and Music Association, offers anyone at the festival an opportunity to sign up to perform before an audience. Free workshops provide hands-on learning on all sorts of instruments and dance forms, and peer-sharing on topics of interest like songwriting and promotion. Spontaneous jams start up all over the festival grounds. Then there's the popular "Band

Scramble" involving a challenge to perform in a serendipitous band drawn from a hat, with one hour to come up with 2 songs and then perform them on stage an hour later. Don't miss it!



Carolyn Cruso Coffeehouse

Friday, 11 September, 7:30 PM

Carolyn Cruso is returning to entertain us at the 3RFS coffeehouse. She is an acclaimed multi-instrumentalist and composer. having toured widely in both the United States and Europe. She is equally at home on hammered dulcimer, flute, guitar and vocals and performs a diverse array of original tunes and songs as well as traditional material.

Her instrumental compositions are mainly for the hammered dulcimer and are inspired by her strong connection to nature as well as her extensive travel and the cultures she has encountered along the way. Her unusual lyrical approach to the dulcimer especially delights audiences and has even won over curmudgeons swearing they hated hammered dulcimer!

Most of her traditional material has been gleaned from her two and a half year sojourn in Europe with late partner Robert Almblade, with whom she performed and wrote for over a decade, as well as playing at Irish sessions around the United States.

The material is largely Celtic and her involvement with that genre colors her original work. As a relative newcomer to the performing/songwriting genre, Carolyn has been surprising fans around the country with the fact that she is a poetic lyricist, a powerfully expressive singer and a strong guitar player. Her lyrics explore love, loss and regeneration and convey a compelling sense of longing. - allow her to find rich voicings to the chords she uses.

Heritage Days Return to Sacajawea

Friday-Sunday, 25-27 September

The Heritage Days event was originally started by the local Lewis & Clark Bicenntennial Council to commemorate the 200th anniversary of the Lewis & Clark Voyage of Discovery. Mid-Columbia Traditional Arts and Music Association has presented the event since 2006, bringing the opportunity to learn about and re-enact the life and skills of early American explorers, the Native American cultures they found along the way, and lives of the early settlers.

Friday is dedicated to receiving school children and letting them see and touch what used to be. Saturday and Sunday are when most people show up to experience the past. You'll experience Lewis & Clark re-enactors, members of the Umatilla, Yakama, and Wanapum People, Mountain man encampments, and a variety of other people who enjoy sharing their skills and knowledge about what life was like nearly two centuries ago.

Heritage Days also includes old-time musicians and entertainers. The Canote Brothers will present their entertaining program on Saturday at 3:00 PM. Greg and Jere Canote were on the National Public Radio program "Sandy Bradley's Potluck" for many years, and have also appeared on NPR's "Prairie Home Companion," as well as performing in numerous concerts, events and festivals. Other old-time musicians will perform throughout the weekend.

On Saturday night there's a bonfire where many people who are camped at the park as well as many more show up to play music, sing, tell stories, and have a good time. The campfire program starts around 7:00 PM.
